The end of the story is most meaningful when you've experienced the fullness of the story leading up to it.

Revelation 7:9-10

"After this I looked, and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands. And they cried out in a loud voice:

> "Salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb."

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The 5-Act Model N.T. Wright

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ACT 1 - Creation (Genesis 1-2)

ACT 2 - Fall (Genesis 3-12)

ACT 3 - Israel (The rest of the OT)

ACT 4 - Jesus (The Gospels - Matthew to John)

ACT 5 - Church (Acts to Revelation)

"We must act in the appropriate manner for this moment in the story; this will be in <u>direct continuity</u> with the previous acts (we are not free to jump suddenly to another narrative, a different play all together), but such continuity also implies discontinuity, a moment where <u>genuinely new things</u> can and do happen.

We must be <u>ferociously loyal</u> to what has gone before and <u>cheerfully open</u> to what must come next... all actors are free to improvise their own fresh scenes... but <u>no actor is free</u> to improvise scenes from another play, or one with a different ending."

Rules of Improv

- 1. This history of the story guides where the story is going
- 2. You can't switch stories!
- 3. The actors must not break character
- 4. The story continues in innovative and new ways
- 5. The story is always pointing toward and anticipating the conclusion.
